Course Description

The Philosophy Department at Tufts University will offer to the students of Beijing Normal University a program entitled "American Philosophy and American Culture." This course is a philosophical examination of some influential writings, extending from the colonial period up to the present, which show the emergence in America of an increasingly secular and egalitarian view of the world built on public reason. With a particular focus on conceptions of justice, toleration, and liberty in American political life, the course begins with an exploration of founding American political documents. The course then uses these documents as a lens to view and discuss issues of inequality, such as slavery and suffrage. The course concludes with an examination of more recent work by political philosopher John Rawls, and range of responses to Rawls made in the spirit of the American philosophical tradition.

Objectives

- To become acquainted with major themes in American religious, political and philosophical culture through a close reading of primary texts and historical sources
- To attain familiarity with contemporary American philosophy and culture through lectures, multimedia presentations, and academic excursions
- To understand the intellectual history of American attention to the virtues of self-reliance, toleration, and pragmatism
