Programme Overview

We are pleased to offer the following bespoke three-week programme to students of Beijing Normal University.

Objectives

The overall objectives of the proposed programme are:

- To develop students' ability to engage in nuanced philosophical debate in English, focusing on constructing arguments and critically evaluating viewpoints through interactive seminars and discussions;
- To broaden students' international outlook through shared exploration of British philosophy and culture, examining its global influences and encouraging diverse interpretations and critical engagement with the material; and
- To enhance students' academic communication skills in English with an emphasis on seminar participation and academic presentation skills.

Components

The following outline syllabi can be considered a basis for discussion. Upon receipt of your expression of further interest we will develop this descriptive account into detailed aims, syllabi and assessment plans in consultation with you. To meet the above objectives, we can offer the following interconnected components:

Introduction to British Philosophy

This core component provides an introduction to key figures and movements in British philosophy, and to the academic research of the University of York's Department of Philosophy faculty members. In this context, students will exercise philosophical inquiry, further developing their ability to construct arguments, analyse texts, and critically evaluate diverse viewpoints.

A preliminary overview of keynote lectures, delivered by the University of York's academic teaching staff includes:

- Mathematical Fictions Professor Mary Leng
- Social Justice and Economic Systems Professor Martin O'Neill
- The Coherence of Creation Dr David Worsley
- Agent-Relativity and the Status of Deontological Restrictions Dr Jamie Buckland
- Do colours exist? Professor Keith Allen
- ❖ Al Ethics Professor Tom Stoneham

Each keynote lecture will be complemented by a seminar led by the same faculty member and will provide a forum for in-depth discussion and critical analysis of the presented material.

Additionally, two excursions will enrich the learning experience, providing real-world connections to the philosophical figures and concepts explored in the lectures and seminars:

- Edinburgh
- Bolsover Castle



Culture

This component aims to enhance participants' awareness and understanding of British culture, broadening their cultural horizons. Through tailored sessions, students will explore compelling aspects of British culture, fostering engaging discussion and deep reflection. These sessions will also challenge students to compare and contrast British cultural elements with their own cultural backgrounds.

Proposed cultural topics include, but are not limited to:

- The History of York
- Social Issues in the UK
- Linguistic Class Codes
- Digital Rights and the Rise of Al

One full-day excursion, to our most popular and highly-rated destination: Whitby, and two half-day excursions in York, will allow students to explore and immerse themselves in local British culture.

Academic Communication Skills

This component focuses on developing essential academic skills and applying them in the context of learning at a British higher education context. Skills developed and practised include effective note-taking for seminars, confident participation in academic discussions (covering clear expression of ideas, respectful engagement with opposing viewpoints, and insightful questioning), reflective thought through Learning Logs using the DAE (Description, Analysis, Evaluation) model to enhance critical thinking and application of philosophical concepts in English, and academic poster design and presentation skills.

Project

The Academic Poster Presentations component provides a platform for students to showcase their learning and develop key academic skills. Students will create visually engaging posters summarising their research on a chosen topic within British philosophy, culminating in a dynamic presentation session. This project fosters critical thinking, research synthesis, and effective communication of complex ideas in English, while also providing valuable experience in presenting research to peers, academics, and Global Opportunities teaching staff and management.

Social Programme

In addition to the above, we provide a programme of social activities across the summer that students are encouraged to participate in while visiting York. These activities are led by our student 'Global Assistants', i.e., University of York students who are trained to provide a great experience for our visiting clients.

Examples of some of the many activities we arrange include:

- various tours in York, e.g., historical tours, ghost tours
- visits to traditional English pubs
- river walks and cruises
- movie nights



Teaching hours

Timings and duration of programme components are typically as follows (based on previous course iterations):

- Three sessions, totalling 4 hours, per day of learning (between 09:30-11:00, 11:30-13:00, and 15:00-16:00).
- The total number of study hours per week will be up to 20 hours.
- There will be two full-day excursions aligned to philosophy themes discussed in lectures.
- There will be one full-day and two half-day excursions aligned to the culture component.

Our approach to teaching

We aim to provide active and experiential learning with students involved and engaged intellectually and effectively. Teachers will be responsive to students' needs and be flexible in adapting to them if required.

Student Assessment

Students will be provided formative feedback on their effort and contributions by teachers in the classroom. Additionally, two assessments will be implemented across the course: Learning Logs, where students will record the critical thoughts on philosophical topics introduced, and Academic Poster Presentations, where students will showcase their learning. Both assessments will be assessed through shared assessment criteria, and formative feedback will be provided by the course tutor.

Programme evaluation

The programme will be evaluated both formatively and summatively.

Formative evaluation

Typically, we use an end-of-week-one feedback questionnaire as a vehicle for mid-course formative evaluation. Tutors, our admin team and the Programme Manager will continually monitor satisfaction with programme delivery through regular contact and dialogue with participants.

Summative evaluation

An on-line end-of-course written evaluation will inform us of revisions and adjustments to be made for future groups. A post-programme tutors' meeting will assess the effectiveness of the course structure, materials and activities, and generate action points to guide programme development. These will be followed up in a pre-course planning meeting for any further cohort. A programme report and evaluation will be sent after the programme along with participant grades and reports, as appropriate.

Certificate

On successful completion of the programme, participants will receive a University of York certificate of attendance.



Accommodation and catering

Accommodation can be provided with carefully selected local host-families and/or in campus accommodation.

Homestay

We have many years' experience of running an extensive and high-quality homestay network. Homestay accommodation includes bed, breakfast and evening meal, with lunch at weekends. Participants will be allocated to families on the basis of their requirements/preferences as far as possible (i.e. pets, smoking, dietary requirements, etc).

Campus accommodation

Campus accommodation in student accommodation in Derwent College or similar can be provided in the summer months. Participants will have access to kitchens and kitchen equipment.

The university has a wide range of cafes and restaurants for lunch and dinner as well as being a 10-minute bus ride from the city centre.



Staffing

Programme Management and Administration

A Programme Manager will be appointed to oversee all aspects of programme design, delivery and evaluation, and will be the main point of contact.

Teaching

Keynote lectures will be provided by the University of York Philosophy Department. Teaching will be carried out by qualified and experienced staff who will be confirmed nearer the time.
