Career Paths

Since its establishment in 2015, the MA Program in Chinese Philosophy has cultivated dozens of outstanding young scholars from all corners of the world, including the United States, Russia, Canada, the United Kingdom, Spain, Singapore, Pakistan, Nepal, Ghana, and Tanzania. Upon graduation, many students have had their papers published in various journals and magazines, including those indexed in AHCI. Some students have continued their studies in China to pursue doctoral degrees in Chinese philosophy and Chinese culture, while others have returned to their home countries to take up teaching and research positions in philosophy at Confucius Institutes, local universities, and research institutions. The MA Program is also particularly well-suited for students who intend to pursue PhD studies or who intend to enter the professional workforce at any international level with relevance to China.

Course Overview

During the first three semesters, students must complete 35 credits from core and elective courses. By the end of the fourth semester, students are required to submit a master's thesis. This requirement offers students the opportunity to conduct independent research in a field of Chinese philosophy of their own interest, thereby deeply enriching their academic experience of studying Chinese philosophy in China.

- ▶ Submit all required information as guided.
 - ▶ Pay an application fee of 600 RMB (non-refundable) through the payment system on the website.
 - ▶ Sit for an online interview (interview notification will be sent via email, and interview results will be shown in the system).

Application Requirements

- ▶ Applicants should be non-Chinese citizens holding a foreign passport and under 50 years old (Date of Birth after August 31, 1976).
- ▶ Applicants should have a degree equivalent to a Bachelor's or above from an accredited college or university.
- ▶ **Language proficiency requirements:**
 - ① All non-native English speakers must certify that they have passed a recognized English-language proficiency test, preferably TOEFL (90) or IELTS (6/5.5).
 - ② Applicants who received their academic degrees from an English language program are not required to provide proof of English proficiency, but must submit relevant documents that support it (e.g., a certificate issued by the graduating institution.)
